





Statewide Conference Call Summary

- Call will now be held on Monday's only.
- Continuing to see a decline of patients in the ICU and particularly those on ventilators. Additionally, the positivity rates coming back continue to look encouraging.
- The State has now received Celex test kits which are one of the 4 FDA approved serology tests. The State is in the process getting these tests to the communities.
- Elective surgeries are now resuming. If there is any reliance on state resources for PPE and other medical supplies however, these facilities should not be resuming these surgeries.
- Although we have made significant progress, we must remain vigilant if we want to move into phase 2 and continue to see the progress we have. Now is not the time to relax precaution measures.
- Proper training and preparedness of healthcare staff is of the utmost priority as we move forward with our response.
- ESS Data is still vitally important. Monitoring bed capacity and availability very closely.
- There should be a regional focus on LTC facilities and nursing homes. Hospitals should be proactively reaching out and working closely with these facilities in the event there is a need to transfer patients from a facility to the hospital. These facilities are not well-equipped enough to provide proper care and that is where the hospitals come into play.
- A vaccination plan at the state level for vaccination training for EMS and Fire Rescue is currently taking place. We encourage you to get your medical director and local Department of Health involved in these conversations now.
- We are seeing that drowning is higher than normal with kids staying at home from school. There are also reports from other parts of the country where there is a decrease in 911 calls for chest pains, but a corresponding increase with 911 calls for cardiac arrest in homes.
- Testing expands across the state. This will include adding community testing sites. Hospitals should attempt to have testing capabilities in-house. Many facilities are requiring negative tests prior to surgery, so in-house, quick turnaround is important.

SURGEON GENERAL'S PRIORITIES

Florida's 5 STEPS to Prevent COVID-19

1 STOP INTRODUCTION

Stop Introduction into Florida from out of state.

2

TEST, TEST, TEST

Leverage testing capabilities & work to expand capacity.

3

ELDERLY & VULNERABLE PROTECTION

Protect the elderly by increased mitigation and messaging at assisted living centers, nursing homes, and other special facilities.

4

PREPARE HOSPITALS

Assess the potential impacts and course of action for hospitals and bed capacity.

5

SOCIAL DISTANCING

Continue to message social distancing.



ESS INFORMATION FOR REPORTING FACILITIES

- ESS is critically important for the State to anticipate demand in the hospital & sub-acute care setting. This data influences decisions on the need for additional support and equipment requests from federal government.
- Facilities MUST verify and update data 2x daily.
- ESS is adding more fields daily. Instructions on these new fields available on the AHCA ESS website.
- Hospitals should estimate the number of med surge beds that can be converted to ICU beds. Do not duplicate bed numbers in different categories. Start with highest acuity beds.
- Corporate Representatives can be established to monitor data entry at individual facilities. Contact AHCA for assistance
